Publishing Courses in Higher Education (UK)

Introduction

In any one year over 500 students graduate from higher education with either a first or second degree or a diploma in publishing. Many of these graduates will seek employment with book and journal publishing companies in the UK. Others will apply to the periodical, advertising and design sectors. The vast majority will be successful in obtaining a position in a media related organisation.

The value of taking a publishing course in higher education is that for up to four years the individual will have studied publishing both from an academic and a vocational perspective.

Publishing can be combined with another discipline such as Business Studies or a science, or can be studied as a post-graduate degree or diploma.

But whatever form the study takes, the graduate will possess a level of knowledge about publishing and publishing skills that will be absent from a graduate of most other disciplines, and will therefore be valuable to future employers.

The purpose of this guide is to acquaint those hoping to forge a career in the industry with the range of publishing courses currently being offered by universities and higher educational institutions in the UK.

The guide gives brief descriptions of all courses included to help readers find the course most suited to their study programme and to their needs. Contact numbers and email addresses are also included and all HE institutions will be pleased to answer questions or provide more details.

Course title: MA Publishing Studies

Length of course: 1 year

Month of completion: September

Course contact: Mary Ann Kernan, Course Director

Entry qualifications: A good 2:1 honours degree in an appropriate discipline and evidence of a commitment to a career in publishing. For mature or returning entrants, appropriate previous work experience may be considered as an equivalent. All prospective students will be interviewed and interview performance will be important for entry.

Part-time or secondment options for the course are available.

Brief description of course

The purpose of the course is to provide existing and prospective publishing professionals with a thorough understanding of the structure, organisation and dynamics of book publishing in its British and International context and equip them with the skills and knowledge to function as effective publishing executives in a fast changing environment. The opportunity to study in publishing in London, the world centre of the industry, under the supervision of an advisory board of industry leaders will give students unrivalled direct experience of the business. The course consists of eight taught units, a period of industry placement and a written dissertation on an approved topic.

Course content

- The world of the book (a broad overview of how the modern industry grew nationally and internationally and covering history, and ethical, political, social and cultural factors)
- Publishing as a business (business principles at industry, firm, imprint, list and project levels)
- Publishing law (intellectual property, copyright, libel, contracts, rights management) Technical publishing knowledge (editing, design, printing, paper, binding, warehousing, distribution, bibliography, information technology) Marketing, promotion and sales principles (including supply chain issues)
- Project acquisition, development and management (how publishing projects are conceived, developed, managed and launched)
- International issues (export, special markets like ELT and journals, electronic issues in the international context)
- The publishing process (an overview of all the functions and operations essential in the publishing system from initial idea to going out of print and beyond).

MA students will be required to attend a course on research methods and seminars on special topics will be offered to develop and expand students' interests and skill sets. "Master classes" from leading industry figures are given in term two. In term three students undertake a supervised placement of 5 to 6 weeks duration in a publishing house, under the direction of a tutor and a mentor provided by the house.

Course Title: MA/MSc in Electronic Publishing

Length of Course: 1 year full-time; 2 years part-time

Course contact: Mary Ann Kernan, Course Director

Entry qualifications: The usual minimum entrance requirement is a good second class honours degree from a UK university, a recognised equivalent from an accredited overseas institution or an equivalent professional qualification. Work experience in some aspect of publishing or the information industry, or evidence of participation in some relevant activity (eg student journalism, construction of web pages) will be advantageous. Previous academic and commercial experience will also be considered.

Brief description of course

This programme is jointly delivered by the Department of Journalism and the School of Informatics. It combines elements of journalism with design and technology and is ideally suited for someone wanting to work in online journalism and other interactive digital media careers. Students are taught by a unique combination of experts with specialist knowledge in areas such as: design, publishing, technology and content production.

City University London's Master's in E-publishing is one of the longest-established and best recognised courses of its type.

We produce graduates with immediately marketable skills in creative design, technology, and business / management processes relevant to electronic publishing.

After a set of core modules, you choose elective modules covering technology and design - preparing you for the increasingly specialised demands of the industry.

You are also encouraged to collaborate with an organisation involved professionally in electronic publishing as part of your project.

You also benefit from superb computing and audiovisual equipment and facilities, including four dedicated PC/Mac labs with specialist software, broadcast-quality audio studios, portable audio recording outfits for location use, and digital video and stills cameras.

The syllabus of the course reflects the multi-disciplinary nature of interactive media publishing. The first term's teaching comprises core modules that cover: the creation of written and aural content, usability, and technical knowledge and skills required by web publishers. The first term also includes a module on Master's level research skills - an essential pre-requisite for the project/dissertation that students complete in the summer.

In the second term students are free to choose from a number of more specialist modules covering the many disciplines involved in the art and practice of electronic publishing including web application development and e-commerce.

The course consists of four core modules and four elective modules. Students successfully completing eight modules and the dissertation will be awarded a masters level qualification. Alternatively, students who do not complete the dissertation but have successfully completed eight modules will be awarded a postgraduate diploma. Successful completion of four modules will lead to the award of a postgraduate certificate.

The School of Printing and Publishing develops professional careers in the book, magazine and new media publishing sectors of the international creative industries.

Brief description of course

The MA Publishing at LCC is an international course for those wishing to enter the global publishing industry and is for existing professionals who wish to advance their careers to management level. The course includes learning pathways for both book publishing or magazine publishing and their related online and digital formats.

The course sets out to enable you to resolve issues and practice through critical problem solving research techniques and approaches and by applying knowledge, technology and management principles to build a critical awareness of the complexity of collaborating professionally with others. Accordingly, there is an emphasis on applying learning through placements, group work and from practical projects with access to probably the most advanced university based publishing production resources centre in the world.

Course content

Phase 1 includes: Content & Marketing for Books or, Content & Marketing for Magazines; Publishing Production & Design; and Integrative Publishing Practices (publishing law, rights, distribution, and finance).

Phase 2 includes: Publishing Management, Research Methods, plus Electives - a choice of two from:

- Enterprise Planning
- Managing Print Suppliers in Publishing
- Work-Based Learning (placement)
- Fashion and Style Publishing
- Information Architecture and Knowledge Management
- Academic Journal Publishing
- Creative Writing for Communications Industry.

Phase 3 includes: Major Project (dissertation) - independent study under supervision. Early in Phase 3 the MA Publishing course visits another city in Europe to examine an alternative publishing culture and market.

Course title: Magazine Publishing

Length of course: 3 years full-time

Award: BA (Hons) Magazine Publishing

Contact: Lorraine Mallon, Course Director

Entry qualifications: 2 A Levels plus 3 GCSE's (A-C) or equivalent qualifications/relevant professional experience.

Brief description of course

This course is presently the only course of its kind that solely focuses on the magazine publishing industry. The course is specifically designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the magazine industry and its relationship with other creative industries. The course focuses on the specialist knowledge and skills required across a range of functions within magazine publishing, especially looking at the magazine industry, content creation, design, branding, advertising sales and distribution.

Course content

Year 1

Provides an introduction to the magazine publishing industry and the changes that it is currently experiencing. You will consider the magazine planning process, the different distribution platforms and explore the new media laws with reference to multi-platform publishing. As magazines depend on good design for success, you will develop design skills using the latest technology.

Year 2

Focuses on the creativity required within magazine publishing, specifically looking at what is involved in creating content for a magazine and how design is integral in interpreting the content. As creativity is a managed process you will also examine effective management skills, such as motivation, leadership styles and working with teams. Advertising sales and distribution management will also be explored. In developing your magazine knowledge and skills you will be required to produce a magazine. This is a group project where you work with the other members of the course however you have the opportunity to focus on the area of magazine publishing that interests you most.

Year 3

Concentrates on business strategy and enterprise and how emerging markets provide opportunities to consider future developments in communication media. In assessing future developments you will adopt a strategic and professional approach to the business of developing magazine publishing initiatives. You will also be required to produce a researched-based major project. This can either be a written dissertation or an artefact with a written critical evaluation.

Course title: BA Book Arts and Design

Length of course: 3 years

Award: MA/PG Diploma

Entry qualifications: 2 A level plus 3 GCSEs (A-C), or equivalent qualifications, or relevant professional experience/ experiential learning, or a combination of formal qualifications and experiential learning.

Brief description of course

Conventional book design and book art and craft skills covered on this course will help you create an innovative portfolio of work. They will also provide a strong technical base for future employment. The course is vocational and includes work placement opportunities. It is designed to develop a creative and innovative approach to 3D graphic arts using the book as the primary medium.

Designed within a credit-based framework this broad based programme provides specialist studies to a professional level. This course will allow you to create a dynamic portfolio of work with a strong technical base for future employment. Book design applications informed by the history and theory of artists books, fine art, photography, illustration, typography and design, combined with craft skills produces a course that will allow the graduate to create a dynamic portfolio of work with a strong technical base for future employment.

Course content

Year 1

First year units includes:

- Book design and production
- Illustration
- Book structure design and bookbinding
- Photography and digital applications
- Fine print and printmaking
- Cultural studies.

Year 2

Second year units includes:

- Form and function
- Illustration and digital applications
- Advanced printmaking (including screen and letterpress printing)
- Artist's books

A more focused direction is taken in this year, in advanced 3D book design, content development and digital applications in book design.

Year 3

In the third year you will undertake a written project and produce two practical major projects for exhibition.

Course title: Publishing with English

Length of course: 3 years/4 years including sandwich year

Month of completion: June

Award: BA (Hons)/BA (Hons) DPS

Entry qualifications: 300 points from 3 A Levels or 2 A Levels and 2 AS Levels, including A Level English, B.

Brief description of course

The philosophy of the department is that there is a common core of knowledge required by all of the information professions. Appropriate specialised professional modules are added for each profession (publisher, librarian, information manager, information and computing officer). Within publishing there is some (but not exclusive) emphasis on academic level publishing and electronic publishing.

Course content

Year 1

Introduction to the Publishing and Information and Society are among the core subjects for the first year. The Department of English and Drama provides core modules on Critical Studies. You also choose specialist optional modules from a wide range offered by English and Drama, such as Introduction to Language and Introduction to the Short Story. Information Science provides modules on Informatics, Web Design and Graphic Design and DTP.

Year 2

You undertake programme-specific core modules such as Publishing Production, Marketing for Publishers and Authors and Editors, as well as covering important areas such as Human Resource Management and Research Methods. In the Department of English and Drama you choose between Creative Writing and Victorian Literature, and can also take more options from a wide range, from Women's Writing in the 17th Century, to Canadian Literature. In Information Science the options include Informatics and Systems and Database Design.

Years 3/4

You follow purely programme-specific modules in the final year, including compulsory ones on the Magazine Business, The Book Trade, Electronic Information Management and Legal and Professional Issues. Again a wide range of relevant English and Drama and Information Science optional modules is open to you. The final-year project offers you the opportunity to study a topic of your own choice in depth with an individual supervisor. If you take the four year sandwich option you will undertake paid professional training for twelve months during Year 3, leading to the further award of a Diploma in Professional Studies.

Brief description of course

The BA Journalism and Publishing Studies degree with honours enables you to study the rapidly changing worlds of journalism and communications on a degree course which provides a unique blend of theory and practice. Combined with Publishing and Media, your degree will extend into an exploration of the function, production, management and distribution of both text and digital media.

Brief description of course

You'll learn through a variety of teaching methods including lectures, seminars & workshops, tutorials, and independent study. There are also regular master classes and visits from professionals working at the highest level in the industry. You will also get the chance to publish a project to professional standards and to contribute to publications in both print and online.

Our new Work Placement module has proven highly successful, even leading to full-time employment for some students. The placements are organised by the Module Leader and every Publishing student is guaranteed a place. Many students have had the opportunity to complete more than one placement, and the list of placements is extremely varied - from authors' agents to publishing houses, from printers to design agencies - thus providing for all publishing interests.

Course content

Trimester 1

Publishing in Context, Publishing in Practice: From Concept to Creation, Creative Toolkit. Successful completion of these modules will make you eligible for a Postgraduate Certificate.

Trimester 2

Publishing Placement & Professional Development, Publishing in Practice: From Creation to Consumer, and a module from the Option Pool, which should allow you to specialise in your chosen area. At present, you can choose from New Venture Creation, From Script to Screen or Interactive Media. A Magazine Publishing module is also planned.

These modules introduce you to business development and management, marketing theory and techniques, rights and product exploitation, and experience of the publishing workplace. Successful completion of these modules will make you eligible for a Postgraduate Diploma.

Trimester 3

You will work on your dissertation, an in depth, industry based research project. On successful completion of this you will be awarded a masters degree.

Brief description of course

This is a very vocationally orientated programme with an emphasis on the acquisition of publishing skills. However, it could also lead on to a research degree. Students are of a high calibre and very motivated. The course has an excellent track record for placing students in full-time publishing jobs, in the whole range of publishing specialisms. The development of IT skills is emphasised.

- MA Publishing: 4 compulsory modules and 2 elective modules
- MA Publishing and Language: 5 compulsory modules and 1 elective module. The MA in Publishing and Language is appropriate for those who wish to work in the field of international co-editions, translations, or international educational publishing. Students focus on language issues in their major project or dissertation.
- MA International Publishing: 5 compulsory modules and 1 elective module. The MA in International Publishing is a good choice for students who may already be working in publishing but want to increase their knowledge of international publishing management and issues related to publishing in a global environment. Students focus on international issues in their major project or dissertation.
- MA Digital Publishing: 6 compulsory modules. The MA in Digital Publishing is part of a group of courses that are respected throughout the world. The course gives a solid knowledge of publishing processes and their management, and provides scope to develop specialist skills required for career development. It also enables in-depth exploration of specialist areas through independent study and the dissertation.

Work experience requirements

Brief description of course

Students have the option of studying Publishing as either a single honours or combined honours degree. Both courses are designed to introduce you to the essentials of publishing and to encourage you to pursue your own interests through independent study. Single honours students can combine modules from other disciplines with their publishing programme, and develop an academic profile that will make them strong contenders for a range of jobs in the communications industries. As part of a combined honours degree, Publishing can be combined with a wide range of subjects; English, Business, Marketing Management and Computing are popular combinations, while History of Art, Law, modern languages or Economics also make excellent partners.

Course content

Year 1 gives an overview of the whole publishing process, introduces the key concepts and locates publishing in today's culture. In Years 2 and 3, students look at publishing as a business and have the opportunity to pursue various specialist pathways, such as editorial, production and design, marketing, and management. There are modules which explore the changing role of publishing in society, and others which focus on IT skills and electronic publishing. From the introduction of the paperback to the advent of the ebook, the programme themes include authorship, textual production, and dissemination in the period from 1870 to the present day. Taught by specialists in the field, it draws on theories of print culture and book history to identify the ideological challenges to the culture of publishing and the ways in which contemporary practice has been shaped by social, economic and technological developments.

Brief description of course

This is a practical course that will enable you to gain skills in the use of computers and will provide an understanding of the impact of IT on the publishing process and its product. This includes an introduction to digital publishing, digital animation, electronic publishing, multimedia, website design. You can choose an option to carry out a project and focus on one area of computing at greater depth. Digital publishing combines well with journalism, English literature and media cultures. At the end of the course you will have a portfolio of work to show to a prospective employer. Your knowledge and skill will give you access to a wide range of careers with excellent prospects.

Course content

This module provides foundation computing, communication and graduate skills for future study in Digital Publishing. Those with relatively little computing experience are welcome on the module, whilst those with prior knowledge are given the opportunity of enhancing and extending that knowledge. Module content includes an investigation of general issues relating to digital publishing such as ebooks, hyperfiction, writing and publishing in the digital age and the role of the Internet. Practical skills developed include the production of presentations and the use of digital cameras and scanners and image manipulation software (currently Adobe Photoshop). Successful students will have a knowledge of on-screen design issues and be able to work effectively in a team. Teaching methods include on-line lectures and workshops. Assessment is by course work only. Students discuss background content via a bulletin board, work on a group electronic presentation and produce a final project report.

Brief description of course

The programme provides graduates from any discipline with the necessary practical skills and knowledge required by the industry. Students are encouraged to develop those personal skills deemed essential to successful publishing, including teamwork, judgement and the exercise of initiative. These elements are embedded in all four of the assessed modules which include both practical and written outcomes. This practicality enables students to appreciate the functions of the many trades and professions which constitute publishing. Students also acquire a positive attitude to the applications of new technology within the industry and its future markets. Brief description of course

This MSc provides the training needed by upper-tier managers in the international publishing industries. The programme will: analyse issues of strategic management within international publishing; apply theoretical and conceptual knowledge derived from real-world case studies; research and construct effective case studies derived from the international publishing industries. Programme members will learn how to make effective strategic decisions relating to their roles. This programme provides the crucial analytical and decision-making skills for managers in the international publishing industry.

The programme aims to develop your expertise and confidence in analysing issues of strategic publishing management. It builds skill and confidence in applying theoretical and conceptual knowledge developed from analysing real-world case studies, all derived from the publishing, communication and creative industries.

The programme enables its graduates to handle the increasing scale and complexity of 21st-century publishing with confidence. Length of course: The MA programme runs over three semesters, with full time students completing in one year, part time students will complete in two years.

Entry qualifications: We normally require a good honours degree or equivalent. However, we will take into account previous experience in the workplace. Informal enquiries are welcome and may be followed by an initial advisory interview (which can be conducted by phone).

Brief description of course

This vocational programme, which runs full time over one year and part time over two years, is aimed at postgraduates who wish to pursue a career in publishing. We work closely with industry partners including several large publishing houses and the BBC (who are moving to the North West shortly) to ensure our graduates are fully prepared for the changing workplace. Our tutors are experienced in the publishing and bookselling industries. By the end of the programme, you will be equipped with knowledge and practical skills to take your part in the future of publishing. We will extend historical knowledge of the physical and economic aspects of publishing culture in relation to the development of mass production in the nineteenth/ twentieth centuries.
